# Vocational Education and Training (VET)

Delivered to Secondary Schools



VET in schools refers to the Vocational Education and Training (VET) Course undertaken as part of the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE).

VCE VET programs are vocational programs approved by the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority (VCAA). VET programs allow the student to combine a vocational pathway with their schooling resulting in a nationally recognised qualification, thereby offering students the opportunity to gain both the VCE and a national portable VET qualification.

VCE VET programs are fully recognised within the Units 1 to 4 structure of the VCE and can contribute towards satisfactory completion of VCE. VCE VET units have equal status with other VCE studies, and some courses offer scored assessment which contribute to an ATAR.



# Why choose VET as part of your Senior School certificate?

VET offers students the following benefits:

- 1. An extra qualification**

You can gain a nationally recognised VET qualification while undertaking your VCE. You receive the VET qualification from a Registered Training Organisation, such as TAFE.
- 2. Study Scores and ATARs**

Some VCE VET programs offer scored-assessed which contribute to an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) like all other VCE 3 and 4 units.
- 3. Connected to the workplace**

VET qualifications give you industry exposure and experience in the workplace that reinforces your skills development. This connection also makes for a smooth transition between training and work.
- 4. Practical**

VET can strengthen your education by giving you the opportunity to gain practical skills and knowledge that compliment your VCE studies. For example, if you want to be an engineer and you are studying VCE Physics and VCE Mathematical Methods, you can develop practical skills, technical knowledge, and industry insight by doing VCE VET Engineering.
- 5. Combines general and vocational studies**
- 6. Realistically explore career options and pathways without leaving school**
- 7. Compliments and contributes to your VCE**

Most course programs are delivered at local TAFEs including: Holmesglen, Chisholm, Box Hill Institute, Kangan Institute and more.

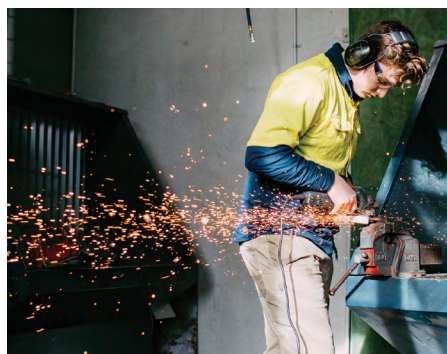
St Leonard's College delivers VCE VET Creative and Digital Media (scored program) on campus when we have sufficient student numbers. VET courses offered on campus are scheduled as part of the timetable.

**Note:** The VET course is a two-year program. It must commence in Year 11 and cannot be started in Year 12.

# How does VET contribute to the ATAR?

The contribution of VCE VET programs to the ATAR is as follows:

- Where a scored VET Units 3 and 4 sequence is available it will contribute directly to the ATAR, either as one of the student's primary four studies or as a fifth or sixth study. Students must complete additional scored assessments and an exam.
- In Year 2 for unscored VET programs, students who successfully complete a VET Units 3 and 4 sequence, can receive a 10% increment towards their overall ATAR of the top 4 subjects.

# Structured Workplace Learning (SWL)

**SWL involves on-the-job training where students are required to master a designated set of skills and competencies related to the VCE VET program.**

Participating in SWL is not a compulsory part of most VET subjects, however, it is highly recommended. SWL provides the context for:

- Enhanced skill development
- Practical application of industry knowledge
- Assessment of Units of Competency
- Increased employment opportunities



Some VCE VET programs have a mandated SWL component such as Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and some units in Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance.

## Fees:

Students commencing a course of VET study with an external provider in 2025 are responsible for payment of any VET fees due.

The cost to participate in a VET course is determined by the VET providers and the College will on-charge at cost.

Fees can range from approximately \$1,600 - \$3,000 per subject, per year.

\*\* Notable exceptions are the Aviation providers, whose fees range from \$10,500 to approximately \$20,000 per year.

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
